

MAGNIFICENT COMMITMENT

Billy Graham died peacefully on Wednesday, February 21 at his home in Montreat, North Carolina after suffering for years with Parkinson's disease. He was 99. For me, Billy Graham was a household name; not because my family was enthusiastic about his evangelism, but simply because his personality and influence were ubiquitous. His given name was William Franklin Graham **II.** Because of age, disease and infirmity he has faded into the background, yielding his influence and the leadership of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association to his son, William Franklin Graham III. Franklin is the Graham who's currently in the spotlight; the son whose gospel has a far more strident, rigid, condemning message for Muslims and the LGBTQ community than his father's. On the train of social justice and equality in diversity, Billy Graham was closer to the caboose than he ever was the engine. But I can't imagine that he was enthusiastic or even supportive of his son's religion of witheringly aggressive discrimination.

Since his death, the media has been awash in tributes to Billy Graham. One that particularly caught my attention is from **Russell Moore**, the President of the Ethics & Religious Liberty Foundation of the Southern Baptist Convention. Here's his quote:

Billy Graham was, in my view, the most important evangelist since the Apostle Paul.

At first, Moore's tribute felt like an exaggeration. But, on reflection, that statement became more believable. Billy Graham worked tirelessly to share the gospel of Jesus Christ. He wasn't a pastor. He was an evangelist. His determination and commit-

ment to bring people to Jesus reached from kitchen table gatherings, to packed stadiums, to the airwaves of radio and TV. And, if his preaching didn't get people on their feet to dedicate their lives to Jesus, George Beverly Shea's divinely rich voice singing How Great Thou Art and His Eye is on the Sparrow did. Moore may just be right.

Billy Graham's version of the gospel was resplendent with personal salvation, but removed from the political implications and consequences of social transformation. So it was not the full gospel. It did not tell the story of the radicalness of Jesus that so threatened the established powers of temple and Rome that it got him crucified. Nevertheless, it was authentically and passionately Billy's. And God used him to change lives...to bring people to Christ... to make a costly commitment to the work of God's love in our hearts and in the hearts of others.

I never met Billy Graham or heard him in person. But a great servant of Jesus who I did have the privilege of meeting was William Sloane Coffin, Jr. Bill served as chaplain of Yale University and as Senior Minister of the Riverside Church in New York City. I first heard him when he delivered a lecture at St. Norbert College in De Pere, Wisconsin. And I met him because he asked to see me! Bill had heard that the church I was serving was struggling with becoming open and affirming; fully inclusive of the LGBTQ community. Bill wanted to thank me and to encourage me on God's way in that righteous cause. That first encounter was followed by several times together that warmed our acquaintance

into a friendship before Bill's passing in 2006. Here's my favorite Bill Coffin quote:

God provides minimum protection, maximum support – support to help us grow up, to stretch our minds and hearts until they are as wide as God's universe.

Minimum protection, maximum support: that's what the 23rd Psalm means when it says:

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me.

Minimum protection: that's the reality of God's precious gift of freedom. Freedom and protection are opposites. God has set us free. But the backside of freedom means that we fully bear the consequences of our own and others' choices.

Maximum support: that's the reality of God's even more precious gift of love. God never lets us go. Or, as the title of Don Clark's sermon at GCC on February 18 said it: **God Remembers Creation**.

Minimum protection, maximum support isn't the whole story. There's a third reality; one that was the bedrock of Billy Graham's and Bill Coffin's ministries. That reality was their unrelenting commitment to bring others to Christ and Christ's way. It was their magnificent commitment: a commitment that tirelessly sought a magnificent commitment from those with whom they shared the gospel.

Often...too often...the church has practiced a strategy of recruitment rooted in minimum commitment. The assumption is that we will recruit more people by asking little of them than we will by asking much.

Personally, I don't believe it. I believe that, if we ask little of people, that's exactly what we will get: little. I also don't believe that that's being honest about God. God doesn't expect nothing from us. God expects everything. And God can honestly do that because God gives us everything...God's only Son...Jesus Christ our Lord. So we ask a great deal; nothing less than conversion to Christ's own way of life, and love, and peace.

Lent is this *magnificent commitment*: God's, and ours. So, as we find our way once more to the cross, let's not ask ourselves, *What's the least I can do to satisfy God?* Let's ask ourselves, *What's the most I can do to love God with my time, talent, and treasure?*

Are we a church of minimum requirements or magnificent commitment? Once more, let's be honest: the love of God in Jesus Christ is costly. But it's also priceless. Being together as God's people at GCC...the flesh and bones of Jesus' body of love in the world today...is one significantly tangible way to experience and express that surpassing value. See you in church!

MIDWINTER CONGREGATIONAL MEETING REPORT FEBRUARY 11, 2018

At our Midwinter Meeting, the congregation received reports on our financial situation and voted on a budget that reflects difficult decisions made to reduce—and eventually eliminate—our annual operating deficits.

Report of the Church Treasurer: Treasurer Chris Clark reported that our year-end budget deficit of approximately \$26,000 was considerably smaller than the \$155,000 deficit we had projected. We benefited from stronger than expected investment and pledge revenues, and at the same time we had no major building expenses in 2017. While it was encouraging that the actual operating deficit was much smaller than budgeted, it did represent the sixth consecutive year the church's expenses have exceeded revenue and have been met by drawing down unrestricted reserves.

Report of the Generosity Team: Brad Smith, Chair of the Resource Ministry, presented the Generosity Team report, noting that the pledges received as of February 5 total \$918,000. The Generosity Team is still trying to contact households that pledged in 2017 but have not responded in 2018. They anticipate a final pledge total of \$965,000, which is below the campaign target of \$1 million. Brad praised the energy and dedication of the Generosity Team, which has conducted a creative, positive campaign.

Update from the Constitution Working Group: Bob McGee, Chair of the Constitution Working Group, reported that CWG is in the process of addressing the initial issues that have been raised concerning the Interim Constitution and Bylaws. The CWG is asking for feedback about the new structure from all groups and individuals within GCC and will hold a session for the entire congregation in early March.

Budget: The congregation voted to approve the 2018 church budget proposed by the Resource Ministry and approved by the Spiritual Council. This budget projects an operating deficit of \$75,000 and is part of a two-year strategy to return the church to a position of balanced operating budgets. It includes two larger cuts in expenses: 1) the elimination of two positions—the Pastor for Congregational Care (effective 7/1/18) and the part-time facilities staff member (effective 4/2/18), and 2) the reduction of the Mission Outreach allocation from 10% to 8% of the previous year's collected pledges. MIRIAM SHE'S ON A ROLL

Straight A's are excellent validation for any student, but for rising eighth-grader Miriam, her place on the high honor roll represents more than academic success. Before being resettled by RefugeeOne in 2012, Miriam didn't speak a word of English and had not set foot in a classroom in years. Her story is one of bravery and determination—as well as the support that a dedicated community can lend.

Miriam was born in Burma in 2000, a country that has been wracked by violent conflict

and human rights violations for more than 50 years. When she was a little girl, her father fled the country in fear for his life. The family hoped his exile would be temporary, but a few years later, it became clear that Miriam, her mother, and her siblings were not safe either. They traveled to Malaysia to join her father, but even outside of Burma, the family's dreams of safety and education were out of reach: refugee children are not eligible for public school there and Miriam's parents could not afford to send their children to private school consistently.

After almost three years in Malaysia, they heard the news: Miriam, along with her mother, father, older sister, and younger brother, would be resettled in Chicago. "I felt uncomfortable and happy too when I arrived. I'd never seen such a city," she explains. "And I felt lonely."

Miriam had courage and a strong network of support from the beginning. RefugeeOne connected her to a charter school with teachers who had experience working with refugees. RefugeeOne's youth program staff served as liaisons between Miriam's home and school, supported her mother and father at parent-teacher conferences to make sure they knew what was happening in class, and provided Miriam free tutoring and computer classes at our after-school program. And Miriam had the help of Tricia Malovey, a teacher who visited her class once a week to help out. "At first, Miriam was a little quiet," Ms. Malovey remembers. "But she was truly excited to learn."

When Miriam arrived in Chicago, she had not been to school in almost two years. She was intent on catching up, though, and so she did. Last year, she wowed the whole school when she placed in the top three at a spelling bee—in English.

This summer, Miriam is one of 80 refugee children at RefugeeOne's summer camp. Along-side staff and a team of energetic volunteers, Miriam and her friends play soccer, work on arts and crafts, and go on field trips to museums and Lake Michigan. In the fall, when school resumes, she'll return to the after-school program with 200 more refugee youth and get a new backpack filled with school supplies from our supporters.

"I appreciate how RefugeeOne continues to be there for Miriam," says Ms. Malovey. "Even as her parents have built security in the jobs RefugeeOne helped them find, and Miriam and her siblings have made friends, the youth program is still a safe place and a bridge between her family life and school life. She holds both of those dearly—she's proud of who she is and where she comes from. And she's already done so much."


