

CONFIRMATION REFLECTIONS

I was having lunch with another pastor recently and we were talking about our confirmation programs.

I knew the next question would be "and how many confirmands are in your 8th grade?" When I answered "38" he almost fell off his chair. That's a fairly typical response. Sometimes I think we're so accustomed to the large classes, that we think it is the norm. But it's not at all. Most churches are fortunate if they have two or three confirmands or maybe even ten! We seem to have an average of 28 who are confirmed each year, so we are normally working with a total of around 60 confirmands. For that, we are thankful.

But it's more than just about numbers, as wonderful as that is. This confirmation program works because of the high standards and expectations we give to our confirmands and their parents. Two years ago I began requiring make-ups if a confirmand missed more than two classes. Not to punish them, but rather to help them to keep up with the fast pace of the curriculum. If a 7th grader last heard about the prophets and we're now into the Gospels, he has lost a lot of ground. Or if an 8th grader misses learning about the sacraments, she may not hear about them again until she is older. Make-ups also help me to know each confirmand better and to engage in ongoing questions of faith.

We just confirmed our newest members a couple of weeks ago and are excited about their beliefs, their leadership skills, and their interest in their church and one another. Our confirmation teachers are also to be commended for giving two consecutive years of their time to their class and investing their own faith development as they guide these young people.

At our weekend retreat, the confirmands are given a list of questions for them to answer honestly and thoughtfully, such as: What do you believe about God? The Bible? Prayer? What difference does Jesus make in your life? What questions or doubts do you still have? How do you think the church can help you continue to grow? These confirmands take seriously their commitments they make before God.

I think that most of them now realize we are all on a faith journey and that we begin again and again and keep moving ahead, wherever we land on this spiritual path.

I like the way author Lauren F. Winner writes in her book *Still: Notes on a Mid-Faith Crisis:*

I think of a story my friend Julian told me. She was twelve, and she was preparing to be confirmed. A few days before the confirmation service, she told her father - the pastor of the church – that she wasn't sure she could go through with it. She didn't know that she really believed everything she was supposed to believe, and she didn't know that she should proclaim in front of the church that she was ready to believe it forever. "What you promise when you're confirmed," said Julian's father, "is not that you will believe this forever. What you promise when you are confirmed is that that is the story you will wrestle with forever."

May all of us continue to wrestle with this story...forever.




HANDS OF PEACE BENEFIT
